

2025 Crime Statistics Summary Report

We believe that maintaining a safe community is a collaborative effort involving the community and the police department. The objective of this publication is to provide the public with an opportunity to stay informed on matters impacting our community. Our hope is that an informed community will be proactive and vigilant in doing their part to assist us in maintaining a safe community for us to work and live.

Calls For Service: In 2025, New Berlin Police Officers initiated or were dispatched to **29,940** calls for service. This equates to an average of 2495 calls per month, 82 calls per day or 3.4 calls per hour. Calls for service are simply a raw number and do not account for the amount of time involved in each respective call or the number of personnel allocated to each call. Furthermore, these totals do not account for routine patrol time, investigations, training time, specialty or public relations assignments or administrative duties of our personnel.

Calls for Service: 2023-2025




Wellbeing Checks: Nationally, law enforcement responds to more calls for service for non-criminal incidents involving a person in crisis than calls for service involving a crime. This statistic proved to be true for New Berlin in 2025, as this was the top category in patrol resource allocation. In 2025, officers responded to **506** calls for service classified as wellbeing checks. Wellbeing checks include checking on someone in which a reporting party has reason to be concerned about a person’s non-criminal behavior and/or wellbeing, to include mental and physical health assessments in the context of a patient’s ability to care for themselves or someone else. Many of the calls for service in this category are requests for law enforcement involvement pertaining to community members who have diagnosed/undiagnosed dementia and are in crisis.


Since most calls for service associated with this category do not involve criminality, the criminal justice system does not have any recourse in addressing the root cause in which patients find themselves in a condition of crisis. In these instances, responding officers complete an assessment of the patient to determine if intervention may be appropriate to mitigate further crisis. When an officer’s assessment leads her/him to believe outside intervention may be necessary or beneficial to the patient, the patient may be placed into protective custody due to self-harm or other destructive behavior, or a referral is made to the Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Waukesha County to determine if voluntary services can be provided. In 2025, the NBPD placed **33** patients in protective custody and completed **17** referrals to the ADRC on behalf of patients in crisis.

- Scammers tell you to **PAY** in a specific way.


Tips to help avoid a scam:

Violent & Sensitive Crime Investigations: In 2025, the New Berlin Police Department's detective bureau investigated **14** sexual assaults (**13** of the cases involved juvenile victims), **8** child abuse/neglect cases, **10** investigations pertaining to Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC), **2** overdose death investigations and the execution of **5** search warrants pertaining to these incidents.





SEXTORTION

It's more common than you think.

SEXTORTION ALERT: Sextortion is currently one of the more significant threats to children online. Sextortion is a form of sexual exploitation where the offender threatens to release compromising material of the victim unless the victim sends money, gift cards, and/or additional sexual content, or engages in sexual activity. Children are particularly vulnerable to this type of crime. Sextortion has led to tragic consequences for victims, including mental health crisis and suicide. **If you or someone you know is in crisis, the National Suicide Hotline is 988. You can call or text to reach a mental health professional.** This public service announcement comes after 2025 Wisconsin Act 48 was signed into law, making sextortion a felony in Wisconsin. The PSA features two Wisconsin families whose children were victims of sextortion.

This is called Sextortion.

It's not your fault, and you are not alone!

- **STOP** responding.
- **DO NOT** send money!
- **GET HELP** from a parent or trusted adult.
- **BLOCK** but **DO NOT DELETE** the messages or your profile.
- **REPORT** the crime.

DRUG ACTIVITY: Many arrests involving the possession of illegal drugs and/or drug paraphernalia are a result of proactive officer activity, usually stemming from a traffic stop involving an observed traffic violation.


Generally, New Berlin Municipal Court has jurisdiction over certain drug violations such as possession of THC (Marijuana) and possession of any type of drug paraphernalia. (Illegal possession of other types of drugs is resolved by Waukesha County Circuit Court. Below is the bond amount associated with drug violations in New Berlin Municipal Court:




1st offense Possession of Controlled Substance (POCS) or Possession of Drug Paraphernalia: \$502.00


2nd offense Possession of Controlled Substance (POCS) or Possession of Drug Paraphernalia: \$880.00

3rd offense Possession of Controlled Substance (POCS) or Possession of Drug Paraphernalia: \$1195.00




Drug Take Back Events: In 2025 we responded to **6** drug overdoses & **2** overdose fatalities. In an effort to reduce drug addiction and drug overdoses, the New Berlin PD has collaborated with Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin-New Berlin Campus and have participated in **22** drug take-back events since 2014. These events provide the community a safe and anonymous method to dispose of unwanted drugs, yielding **13,831 pounds** collected. The graph charts our local collection efforts. 





Domestic Incidents: We responded to **75** incidents involving some type of reported domestic disturbance in 2025. Since 2021, the New Berlin Police Department participated in a nationally recognized program, the Lethality Assessment Program (LAP). The objective of LAP is to reduce lethal incidents involving intimate partners. This program includes training of sworn officers in use of the lethality assessment tool applied to abuse incidents involving intimate partners, subsequent documentation of the assessment and a continued collaboration with domestic violence advocates on all cases. Of the 75 reported domestic incidents, officers completed **23** lethality assessments in which **19** of the victims were assessed to be in a high-risk relationship and advocacy was facilitated. The following graph depicts the number of total screenings in relation to victims to be assessed as in a high danger vs. non-high danger intimate relationship. All victims were afforded the opportunity at the time of the incident to speak with an advocate.



The following graph is a comparison of assessments completed in 2021 to 2025. As depicted, we completed 23 assessments in 2025, 29 assessments in 2024, 32 assessments in 2023, 18 assessments in 2022 and 37 assessments in 2021.



Property Crime: As depicted below, we recognized a decrease in property crime across the board. One of the factors in a decrease of completed property crimes in our community is attributed to proactive citizens watching out for their neighbors and reporting suspicious behavior. Keep up the good work!



Referrals for Municipal Prosecution: In 2025, officers and detectives issued **5583** municipal citations for non-criminal prosecution in New Berlin Municipal Court.



Referrals for Criminal Prosecution: In 2025, the New Berlin PD referred **727** charges involving adult & Juvenile offenders to the Waukesha County District Attorney's Office for case review, reference misdemeanor or felony prosecution. Additionally, **277** state traffic citations were issued.




Reportable Traffic Crashes: In the State of Wisconsin, you are required to report any crash involving an injury of a person or any crash involving \$1000.00 or more damage to any person's vehicle or property or any crash in which \$200.00 or more is sustained to state or other government-owned property other than a vehicle. In 2025, the New Berlin police department responded to a total of **675** reportable traffic crashes. The chart below categorizes the type of reportable crashes. 


2023-2025 Traffic Crash Location & Factors

2023 2024 2025




Grant-Funded Traffic Initiatives: Nationally recognized best practices in combating traffic fatalities and serious injury crashes include implementation of "High Visibility Enforcement" initiatives. The New Berlin Police Department's Mission Statement reads, *"The mission of the New Berlin Police Department is to protect the lives and property of the people we serve and prevent crime through partnership with the community."* A major component of our mission is protecting lives and property. Throughout 2025, the New Berlin Police Department participated in three grant-funded traffic initiatives allowing us to allocate officers to focus on specific violations during prescribed time frames. These initiatives included, "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over," (impaired driving enforcement) "Click It or Ticket," (seat belt enforcement) and "Speed Wave" (speeding and aggressive driving enforcement). While officers assigned to these initiatives primarily focused on specific violations, officers also took appropriate enforcement actions on other additional traffic/equipment violations.






Vehicle Pursuits: In the performance of their duties to apprehend an offender who had fled following a violation of state statutes, officers of the New Berlin Police Department were involved in a total of **22** pursuits in 2025. **9** pursuits involved the offending vehicle crashing, **14** of the pursuits were terminated by the initiating officer due to safety concerns and **9** involved offenders were taken into custody post pursuit. Prior to engaging in a pursuit, New Berlin officers are trained to balance the public's interest in apprehending an offender in relation to the inherent risk involved in pursuing vehicles.

2025 Pursuit Dispositions






Parking Enforcement Statistics: In 2025, the New Berlin Police Department recognized a three-year high in the amount of parking citations issued, in which most of the citations were issued for **NIGHT PARKING** violations. Enforcing our night parking ordinance is vital for maintaining municipal operations, public safety, and neighborhood order.

- **Emergency and Service Access:** Clear streets are essential for the safe passage of fire trucks, ambulances, and other emergency vehicles. In winter, night parking restrictions allow snowplows to fully clear and salt roads, preventing hazardous build-ups of ice.
- **Public Safety and Crime Prevention:** Night parking restrictions assist police officers on overnight patrols by providing a clearer line of sight and helping identify abandoned or suspicious vehicles.
- **Neighborhood Maintenance:** Night parking restrictions assist with the prevention and identification of long-term vehicle storage on public roads, which can lead to "undesirable" neighborhood factors like abandoned cars or people living in vehicles.
- **Managing High-Density Demand:** In areas with limited parking availability, a night parking ordinance promotes vehicle turnover, ensuring residents and their guests can find parking near their homes.
